MISSION

Inspiration from our Mission

Garden of Peace and Remembrance | Falls Church, VA

Nestled in one of our early Sacred Places, St. Anthony's of Padua, there is a fountain with a design and presence that embody our mission and impact. Atop the stone base sits a glass plate, engraved with the word "peace" in 80 languages, each representing a culture within the greater community. During the design process, translations were inscribed on pieces of paper and released into the wind, a deliberate act to ensure equitable representation. The final layout of the design was determined by where these papers landed.

Just like this fountain, where the stream of water sends ripples spreading across the surface, our mission emanates from the generosity of our donors, creating far-reaching ripples of impact.

"We chose water to represent peace.
Flowing water, like hunger for peace, is constant. No matter how many times we are knocked down in our quest for peace, it is important that we get up and keep on trying, just as rivers keep flowing.
Our fountain is a representation of this concept. It is made of rough-cut fieldstone, representing the earth, hardship, and the rough edges of humanity."

Firesouls are volunteer community leaders — catalysts for change who recognize the need and vital role a green space can offer within their community. They serve as community liaisons, ensuring that each Sacred Place is designed with the community's needs at the forefront.



In each Sacred Place, you will find a Nature Sacred bench, inviting visitors to take a moment of respite and enjoy the nature around them. Tucked under each bench is a little yellow journal, a place for visitors to connect and reflect.





Community Healing Spotlight Filbert Street Garden | Baltimore, MD

Filbert Street Garden exists in a food desert (40-minute walk to the grocery store from the garden) while only one-third of residents own a car.

This soon to be Sacred Place initially started out as a simple place where people could have a garden plot and mitigate the food desert challenges but became so much more through our multi-phase, community-led design process. The vision that emerged includes a system of pathways that provide better access to the areas within, common areas with lighting and shade, and a meditative space for visitors, including our signature bench.

Filbert Street Garden is one of 18 Community Farming sites across the United States in our Sacred Place network.

Nature for Wellness Spotlight Garden of Gratitude at MedStar Health | Baltimore, MD

MedStar's Franklin Square campus is home to a decades-seasoned Sacred Place—the Garden of Little Angels, a memorial loss garden located in the Women's Pavilion. MedStar has chosen to invest in the mental health of their associates with a second Sacred Place, which will be private to staff and intended for restorative, more private moments in nature.

In a first-ever for Nature Sacred and at the recommendation of the Firesouls, the Design Charrettes started at the wee hours of the morning to accommodate the staffing shift change and rhythm of the hospital. Over two days, more than 300 employees shared their vision for the space. The design process and the outcome are meaningful investments in the people at the heart of the organization.

"Just 10-15 minutes away from the front lines can significantly mitigate the negative effects of trauma. Providing a brief respite in a safe space is crucial for preventing longer-term stress injuries, including PTSD. This isn't just a warm and fuzzy gift to staff - it's a means to keep them healthy." — Firesoul Rev. Cherie Smith

Enrichment Grant Recipient Spotlight University of Maryland's Garden of Reflection and Remembrance | College Park, MD

The University of Maryland's Garden of Reflection and Remembrance supported two events where students participated in a five-senses meditation, walked the labyrinth together, and enjoyed lunch and conversation.

University of Maryland is part of our strategic site partner program. An initial TKF grantee, they are expanding with support from Nature Sacred because of their demonstrated activation of their Sacred Place for the wellbeing of their campus community.

As the need to prioritize student mental health escalates in a postpandemic world, Nature Sacred is growing the number of educational institutions within the network.

Enrichment Grant Recipient Spotlight Naval Cemetery Landscape | Brooklyn, NY

An enrichment grant for the Naval Cemetery Landscape supported three artist residencies in the spring. One visual and two musical artists where chosen to explore the healing power of nature, contemplation and memorial, and the dynamic history of the Sacred Place. The Firesouls reported that this program enriched their popular free community programming with two artist-led workshops (drawing and painting) and four free public music performances. The first event featured local musician, Paco Naveira, who showcased instrumental and vocal motifs on nylon string guitar. Paco performed compositions throughout the site with a small, portable amplifier attached to his body, sharing spontaneous musical and meditative moments with visitors on-site.

This dynamic program was one of the 46 Enrichment and Enhancement Grants that Nature Sacred funded in 2023.

We have long believed that the strongest evidence of the impact of Sacred Places lies within the journal entries we've gathered since the opening of the first Sacred Place. In 2023, we brought this conviction to life by publishing a paperback version of BenchTalk: Wisdoms Inspired in Nature, which showcases a carefully selected collection of these journal entries. Our national tour to promote the book and raise awareness about Sacred Places, along with the continued interest in our healthcare calculator—a collaboration with Sean Murphy, a Health Economist at Weill Cornell Medicine—has significantly broadened the recognition and appreciation of our work, further amplifying the message of the importance and transformative power of Sacred Places.







TOM STONER

CO-FOUNDER, NATURE SACRED
JAN 10, 1935 - OCT 19, 2023

Sacred Place at Inspiration Point, Annapolis, MD

"Quietly, beneath the drumbeat of global dysfunction and discouragement, there is an *emerging shift in imagination*. it is a growing phenomenon. This shift demonstrates a burgeoning realization that a place intentionally connected to nature can be a gift that *calms* the soul, *replenishes* the spirit, and *rekindles* a sense of community. The seed for this shift comes from our ability to tap into an *inner Sacred Place* and to have an open heart."

In a world fraught with isolation, distress, and haste, Tom Stoner, Co-Founder of Nature Sacred, sought to foster moments of beauty, peace, and tranquility of true human connection, *for all*.

Nearly three decades ago, in a London city park, Tom and Kitty, his wife of 50 years, experienced a shared transformative moment in nature. It was in that serene space, enveloped by a sudden profound sense of calm and healing—that the germ of an idea was formed.

Upon their return to the US, they set about founding the TKF Foundation, which has since evolved into Nature Sacred, as the call for the mission and outreach capacity continues to be strengthened by like-minded supporters. Through this work, he helped bridge gaps, brought solace, and instilled hope.

It was this work that Tom would ultimately consider his most important, that would become his greatest passion and legacy, profoundly impacting people and communities in urban green spaces—from New York to Baltimore; Washington, D.C., to northeast Alabama; and Iowa to Oregon.

The seeds Tom planted, in partnership with and alongside countless others, continue to grow. He continues to inspire us to nurture the connection between nature and humanity, and to create spaces where healing and unity happen. Together, we can continue to find a better way through nature.

On behalf of the Nature Sacred team and the Stoner family, thank you for the outpouring of love, generous memorial gifts, and heartfelt tribute messages.
